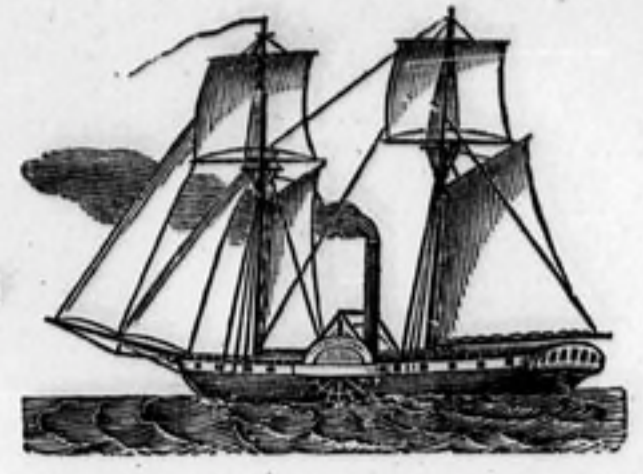

ENROLLMENT.



IN CONFORMITY to an Act of the Congress of the United States of America, entitled "An Act for Enrolling and Licensing Ships and Vessels," &c. passed the 18th of February, 1793; and "An Act to regulate the Foreign and Coasting Trade on the Northern, Northeastern and Northwestern Frontiers of the United States, and for other purposes," passed the 2d March, 1831. Richard Meek of Buffalo N.Y.

having taken or subscribed the Oath required by said Acts, and having sworn that he together with Jonathan Mayhew of the same place are

Citizens of the United States, sole owners of the Schooner or Vessel called the Panama of Buffalo whereof Richard Meek is at present Master; and, as he hath sworn is a Citizen of the United States, and that the said Ship or Vessel was built at Silver Creek New York in the year 1834 as appears by her enrolment now surrendered by reason of a change of owners, dated at the Port of Buffalo May 29th 1837 and numbered (29) Twenty nine And the said enrolment having certified that the said Schooner or Vessel has one deck and two masts and that her length is Fifty nine feet and six inches her breadth Eighteen feet and nine inches her depth Six feet and seven inches and that she measures Sixty two tuns Sixty six ninety-fifths; that she is a Schooner has no galleries and has a scroll head. And the said Richard Meek having agreed to the description and admeasurement above specified, and sufficient security having been given in conformity with the terms of the said acts, the said Schooner has been duly Enrolled at the Port of Buffalo Creek.
