

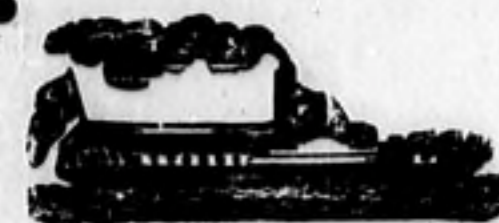

An act of Congress of the United States of America, entitled "an Act for Enrolling and Licensing Ships and Vessels," &c. passed the 18th February, 1793, and "an Act to regulate the Foreign and Coasting Trade on the Northern, Northeastern and Northwestern Frontiers of the United States, and for other purposes," passed the 2d March, 1831, and "an Act to provide for the better security of the lives of passengers on board of vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam," passed 7th July, 1838.

having taken or subscribed the Oath required by the said Acts, and having sworn that he is a

CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES, sole owner of the Schooner or Vessel called the Commodore Chauncey whereof John M. Reide is at present Master; and, as he hath sworn is a Citizen of the United States, and that the said Ship or Vessel was built at Silver Creek - New York in the year 1843 as appears by the Certificate of Charles M. Embley of Silver Creek N.Y. Shipwright dated October 11th 1843

And the said Certificate having certified that the said Schooner or vessel has One Deck and Two Masts, and that her length is Sixty four feet and one inch her breadth Nineteen feet and one inch her depth Seven feet and seven inches and that she measures Eighty tons Seventeen ninety-fifths; that she is a Schooner has no galley and a Stern head.

And the said Chauncey Lapham having agreed to the description and admeasurement above specified and sufficient security having been given in conformity with the terms of the said acts, the said Schooner has been duly enrolled at the Port of Buffalo Creek.
