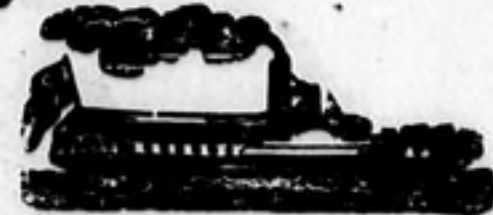

IN CONFORMITY TO

An act of Congress of the United States of America, entitled "an Act for Enrolling and Licensing Ships and Vessels," &c. passed the 18th February, 1793, and "an Act to regulate the Foreign and Coasting Trade on the Northern, Northeastern and Northwestern Frontiers of the United States, and for other purposes," passed the 2d March, 1831, and "an Act to provide for the better security of the lives of passengers on board of vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam," passed 7th July, 1838.

Henry H. Sizer of Buffalo Erie Co. (New York) ...  
having taken or subscribed the Oath required by the said Acts, and having sworn that he together with William C. Brown of Lockport (New York being

CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES, sole owners of the Schooner ... or Vessel called the Henry H. Sizer of Buffalo ... whereof D. W. Derrinow ... is at present Master; and, as he hath sworn ... is a Citizen of the United States, and that the said Ship or Vessel was built at Sea King Harbor New York ... in the year 1845 as appears by her enrollment dated at the Port of Buffalo New York the 5th day of August 1845 ...

And the said Enrollment ... having certified that the said Schooner ... or vessel has two Masts ... and one Deck ... and that her length is One hundred & four feet ... her breadth Twenty four feet and three inches ... her depth Nine feet and six inches ... and that she measures Five hundred & forty one tons and six ninety-fifths: that she is a Schooner ... has a square stern & no gally ... and a small ... head.

And the said Henry H. Sizer ... having agreed to the description and admeasurement above specified, and sufficient security having been given in conformity with the terms of the said acts, the said Schooner ... has been duly enrolled at the Port of Buffalo Creek.
