

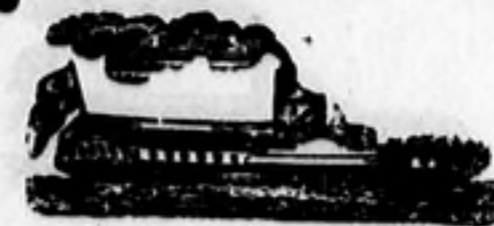

IN CONFORMITY TO

An act of Congress of the United States of America, entitled "an Act for Enrolling and Licensing Ships and Vessels," &c. passed the 18th February, 1793, and "an Act to regulate the Foreign and Coasting Trade on the Northern, Northeastern and Northwestern Frontiers of the United States, and for other purposes," passed the 2d March, 1831, and "an Act to provide for the better security of the lives of passengers on board of vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam," passed 7th July, 1838.

Alonso G. Ford of New Orleans Co. N.Y. having taken or subscribed the Oath required by the said Acts, and having sworn that he is a

CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES, sole owner of the Canal Boat or Vessel called the Motion whereof U. G. Ford is at present Master; and, as he hath sworn is a Citizen of the United States, and that the said Ship or Vessel was built at Rochester N.Y. in the year 1846 as appears by the certificate of J. Howell, Master-builder, now on file in this office

And the said certificate having certified that the said Canal Boat or vessel has one Deck and that her length is seventy eight feet six inches her breadth fourteen feet four inches her depth four feet ten inches and that she measures fifty tons ninety three ninety-fifths that she is a Canal Boat has and no head.

And the said Alonso G. Ford having agreed to the description and admeasurement above specified, and sufficient security having been given in conformity with the terms of the said acts, the said Canal Boat has been duly enrolled at the Port of Buffalo Creek.
