In conformity to an Act of the Congress of the United States of America, entitled "An Act for Enrolling and Licensing Ships and Vessels," &c., passed 18th February, 1793; and "An Act to Regulate the Foreign and Coasting Trade on the Northern, Northeastern and Northwestern Frontiers of the United States, and for other purposes, passed March 2d, 1831; and "An Act to provide for the better security of the lives of passengers on board Vessels propelled in whole or in part by Steam," passed 7th July, 1838.

having taken or subscribed the Oath required by said Acts, and having sworn that he is

together with Elijah B. Bruce of Buffalo New York and

Master of the United States, and sole owner of the Schooner or Vessel, called the Philadelphia whereof Samuel M. Brown is at present Master; and as he hath sworn Samuel M. Brown is a Citizen of the United States, and that the said Ship or Vessel was built at Providence Rhode Island in the year 1836 as appears by the Enrollment dated

at the Port of Providence the twenty seventh day of April 1848 numbered (9) and said Samuel M. Brown having changed name

And the said Enrollment having certified that the said Schooner or Vessel has One Deck and two Masts, and that her length is seventy nine feet and two inches 49 feet 0 inches her breadth twenty two feet and two and one half inches 22 feet 2 inches her depth seven feet eight and one half inches 7 feet 8 inches and that she measures One hundred and twenty two tons seventy two ninety-fifths; that she is a Schooner has One Gallies and One head

And the said Watson A Fox having agreed to the description and admeasurement above specified, and sufficient security having been given in conformity with the terms of the said acts, the said Schooner has been duly Enrolled at the Port of Buffalo.
